What? Pot-luck Shabbat dinners hosted in congregant's homes. Informal...friendly...relaxed get-togethers. A little ritual (blessings over candles, wine and challah) and plenty of socializing. Hosts only need to open the door with a smile and provide a set table. Guests bring an assigned dish to share.

Why? To break bread together, to have unexpected conversations, to experience the joy of Shabbat, to enjoy each other's company, and to meet someone new or to get to know each other in much deeper ways.

- Are there any pets in your home? What kind and how many?
- Do you have any restrictions regarding smoking, fragrances, food, children, etc.?
- Is your home wheelchair accessible?

Hosts and attendees will receive more information during the planning process, including contact information, assignment of dinner locations, and a final reminder of what to bring the week of the dinner.

From the Rabbi's Study

Tisha b'Av - the 9th of Av



During the heat of summer comes this holy day of *Tisha b'Av*. It is a solemn day on which Jews mourn the destructions of the First and Second Temples in Jerusalem in 586 B.C.E. and 70 C.E., respectively. The restrictions on *Tisha b'Av* are similar to those on Yom Kippur: to refrain from eating and drinking (even water)

from sundown to sundown, washing, bathing, shaving and wearing cosmetics; wearing leather shoes, and engaging in sexual relations. Unique to *Tisha b'Av* is a prohibition against the study of Torah (which is considered a joyful endeavor); instead, it is customary to study sad and painful passages such as the Book of Lamentations, Job, and parts of Jeremiah.

Many traditional mourning practices are observed: sitting on low stools and refraining from smiles, laughter, and idle conversation. In the synagogue, the Book of Lamentations is read; the liturgy is marked by a haunting melody; the lights are dimmed; the Ark is draped in black or it is left open and emptied of all Torah scrolls; worshippers sit on the floor or low benches and don't wear a *tallit* or *t'fillin*.

What does *Tisha b'Av* mean for Reform Jews? Historically, the Reform movement has downplayed the observance of *Tisha b'Av* because we may not mourn the destruction of the Temples; we may not consider ourselves in exile; we may not pray for the rebuilding of the Temple or for the return of the sacrificial cult; and we may not accept the theology that our tragedies were punishment for our sins.

However, *Tisha b'Av* does afford us the opportunity to experience communal grief for all Jewish tragedies (such as the Crusades, the expulsion from Spain, and the Holocaust) and to reflect on our own personal losses and grief. Although we may not feel in physical exile, we may be in spiritual exile or in exile from communal life. *Tisha b'Av* is also an appropriate time to recall other human tragedies in history and to reflect on current suffering throughout the world.

Reading the Book of Lamentations can teach us that what is painful to us <u>can</u> be talked about; and it can model for us how to handle grief, cope with a crisis, and express our rage: that lament is a first step towards healing. With the *Mincha* (afternoon) service on *Tisha b'Av* the atmosphere and mood changes. Tradition teaches that on the day of our deepest sadness, the Messiah will be born and our greatest joy will be celebrated; we are able to experience the first sense of joyful and hopeful renewal. Thus, at *Mincha* one can wear a *tallit* and *t'fillin*; one can wear leather shoes and perfume; and one can study Torah. On both the communal and the personal levels, *Tisha B'Av* serves as a reminder that out of disaster comes renewal.

This year, *Tisha b'Av* falls on Sunday, August 11. Join us on Shabbat morning (August 10), to study and discuss the Book of Lamentations. And join me at 7:30 pm on the northeast side of Holmes Lake for the 36th Annual Nebraskans for Peace Lantern Float (more information on page 3).

Clinic with a Heart continues to grow and serve more patients and provide more services to the Lincoln community. As we grow, we find we need to deepen the volunteer pool. We are particularly interested in three specific areas:

Office team: Shifts at 9:00 am-12:00 pm. 12:00-2:00 pm; includes such tasks as answering the phones, special projects, filing, reception to patients needing information about the clinics, etc.
