POP-UP SHABBAT DINNERS

When? Our next Pop-up Shabbat will be on September 11, 2019. We have two host homes this month.

What? Pot-luck Shabbat dinners hosted in congregant's homes. Informal...friendly...relaxed get-togethers. A little ritual (blessings over candles, wine and challah) and plenty of socializing. Hosts only need to open the door with a smile and provide a set table. Guests bring an assigned dish to share.

Why? To break bread together, to have unexpected conversations, to experience the joy of Shabbat, to enjoy each other's company, and to meet someone new or to get to know each other in much deeper ways.

- How many guests do you wish to invite?
- Are there any pets in your home? What kind and how many?
- Do you have any restrictions regarding smoking, fragrances, food, children, etc.?
- Is your home wheelchair accessible?

assignment of dinner locations, and a final reminder of what to bring the week of the dinner.

SHABBAT SHUVAH HEALING SERVICE

The Shabbat between Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur is known as *Shabbat Shuvah* – the Sabbath of Turning referring to the fundamental theme of the High Holy Day season: Our turning – or <u>returning</u>. We turn away from transgression; we turn back to G-d, to Torah, to one another, to the best of our true selves. This year, we will be offering a special healing service for Shabbat Evening on **Friday**, **October 4** at **6:30 pm**. Through special rituals, music, and readings, our service is intended to provide you with hope for a return to wholeness.

KEVER AVOT MEMORIAL SERVICE

The words *kever avot* literally mean the "graves of our fathers." It is traditional to visit the graves of our loved ones between Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur: in the hope that our loved ones will intercede on our behalf with G-d during this time of judgment; and to allow us to honor those who so deeply affected our lives. Rabbi Appleby will be conducting a Kever Avot service at Wyuka Cemetery on **Sunday, October 6** at **11:30** am.

JEWISH BOOK CLUB

We'll discuss the book Spies of No Country by Matti Friedman

(originally scheduled for September 22, but postponed until November)

Good Reads says: Award-winning writer Matti Friedman's tale of Israel's first spies has all the tropes of an espionage novel, including duplicity, betrayal, disguise, clandestine meetings, the bluff, and the double bluff-but it's all true.

The four spies at the center of this story were part of a ragtag unit known as the Arab Section, conceived during World War II by British spies and Jewish militia leaders in Palestine. Intended to gather intelligence and carry out sabotage and assassinations, the unit consisted of Jews who were native to the Arab world and could thus easily assume Arab identities. In 1948, with Israel's existence in the balance during the War of Independence, our spies went undercover in Beirut, where they spent the next two years operating out of a kiosk, collecting intelligence, and sending messages back to Israel via a radio whose antenna was disguised as a clothesline. While performing their dangerous work these men were often unsure to whom they were reporting, and sometimes even who they'd become. Of the dozen spies in the Arab Section at the war's outbreak, five were caught and executed. But in the end the Arab Section would emerge, improbably, as the nucleus of the Mossad, Israel's vaunted intelligence agency.

Bringing of treats is permitted. Also note that this is not intended to be a women's-only group; men are welcome!

FEEDING THE KIDS AT F STREET



F-Street Community Center being helped by the organization We Can Do This

Once a month for the last three years, South Street Temple and Tifereth Israel volunteers have been feeding the kids at the F-Street Community center where children, adults, and senior citizens can go and find a safe, fun and recreation-based environment. F-Street provides many activities throughout the week that strengthen family unity, personal growth, health, and community awareness.

Four years ago, the staff noticed that there was a need to provide meals to the children on the weekend. They were noticing kids being dropped off early and picked up late with little or no food to eat during the day. F-Street does not provide meals during the weekends, nor is it in their budget, so they reached out to the community for

help. That is when the volunteer group, We Can Do This, stepped in to provide meals for youth at F-Street during the weekend. Susan Brown, the Coordinator, for We Can Do This started this support group to help feed the

Our Lincoln Jewish community helps to plan meals, find volunteers, and serve a meal to the youth at F-Street once a month. As head of our group, Aimee Hyten feels it is a great opportunity to ensure children are not going hungry in our community. "It is fun to make something healthy that the kids enjoy eating" she says. "Plus all the Jewish youth and volunteers really enjoy interacting with the children at F-Street. It is a great way to show your family, friends, and neighbors that the Jewish community enjoys giving back."
